Care For the Homeless (CFH) and Urban Pathways Host Ceremony to Memorialize Homeless New Yorkers Who Died in 2025

Homeless Persons' Memorial Day Observance on December 18 Gathers NYC Community Members to Pay Tribute to Individuals Lost in 2025

New York, NY – December 1, 2025 – Care For the Homeless (CFH), a leading New York City non-profit that provides health care, shelter, and supportive services to people experiencing homelessness, joins fellow non-profit Urban Pathways, which provides outreach, housing, and individualized support to help New Yorkers move toward stability, to host Homeless Persons' Memorial Day on Thursday, December 18.

Held at Congregation Rodeph Sholom in the Schafler Forum at 7 West 83rd Street, the event will be free and available for public attendance. Programming will include a free meal for all attendees at 4:30pm, followed by a ceremony at 5:30pm to honor the New York City individuals who passed away this year while unstably housed or due to the stressors of homelessness. The evening will include eulogies and a reading of the name(s) of each person lost. A bell will toll, and a candle will be lit to honor each name read, marking a reflection for many who will not receive any other commemoration for the lives they lived. Over 200 individuals will be recognized during the observance.

"Each year, against the backdrop of a holiday season meant to exude joyfulness, we are deeply and humbly reminded of the tens of thousands of individuals who still struggle to secure their basic needs across New York," said George Nashak, CFH President and CEO. "It is our hope that this program not only garners recognition of the lives lost but also helps attendees understand the gravity of this ongoing public health crisis and strengthens collective support for meaningful, long-term solutions."

Homeless Persons' Memorial Day is a collective grassroots effort born through the partnership between CFH and Urban Pathways to provide a dignified remembrance for the hundreds we lose each year to the trauma of homelessness. It also serves as an opportunity for individuals and families from across New York City to join with others advocating for effective solutions to ending homelessness. The observance convenes service providers, community and faith leaders, policymakers, longtime supporters, and New Yorkers with lived experience of homelessness – underscoring the continuum of care that health, housing, and social service organizations work together to provide.

According to Fred Shack, Chief Executive Officer of Urban Pathways, "It is important to co-host the Homeless Persons' Memorial Day each year. We gather because every person we lost deserved warmth, safety, and dignity. We speak their names because silence is another form of injustice. Humanity demands remembrance—and change. As a City, we must work collectively to end homelessness and ensure that no one's final chapter should be written in the shadows. On this night, we bring their lives into the light."
